Any person who is representing a person other than themselves and is receiving compensation to influence an action by the Mayor and Council, shall, before speaking, identify themselves as a "retained speaker". Pursuant to the Arizona Open Meeting Law, individual Council Members may ask the City Manager to review the matter, ask that the matter be placed on a future agenda, or respond to criticism made by speakers. However, the Mayor and Council may not discuss or take legal action on matters raised during "call to the audience".

8. ZONING: (C9-06-26) SECOND HOUSTON ENTERPRISE - WILMOT ROAD, SH TO C-2, CITY MANAGER'S REPORT

- a. Report from City Manager JAN9-07-12 WARD 5
- b. Report from Zoning Examiner dated December 15, 2006

- c. Request to rezone approximately 55 acres from SH (Low-density, Large Lot, Single-Family Residential) to C-2 (General Commercial). Applicant: Mike Grassinger of the Planning Center, on behalf of the property owners, Adam Hatch of Second Houston Enterprise Company. The rezoning site is located on the south side of Interstate-10, approximately 600 feet west of Wilmot Road. The applicant proposes to construct 23 structures up to two stories and 40 feet in height, with a total of 577,100 square feet of retail uses on 64 acres.

The rezoning request is in substantial compliance with the policies in the *Rincon-Southeast Subregional Plan* and the *General Plan*. Approval of the requested C-2 zoning is appropriate subject to compliance with the recommended conditions.

The Zoning Examiner held a public hearing on November 20, 2006, on behalf of the Mayor and Council. The Zoning Examiner recommends authorization of C-2 zoning.

Staff recommends authorization of C-2 zoning subject to the recommended conditions.

1. A development plan in substantial compliance with the preliminary development plan dated November 17, 2006, and the Design Compatibility Report, is to be submitted and approved in accordance with Section 5.3.8. of the *Land Use Code*. The development plan shall include both the Old Rodeo Wash, and the existing C-2 zoned parcels along I-10 as depicted on the preliminary development plan dated November 17, 2006.
2. The owner/developer shall design and construct the west half of *the Major Streets and Routes Plan* cross-section (or as otherwise approved by Tucson Department of Transportation) along Wilmot Road from the eastbound I-10 frontage road to East Diablo Sunrise Road. These improvements shall include appropriate pavement transitions beyond the limits of the improved section, six-foot-wide sidewalks, a median island, traffic signals/traffic signal modifications, turn lanes (as required by Tucson Department of Transportation) and 100-year storm capacity reinforced concrete drainage structures. The above mentioned improvements are for the immediate benefit of the developing site and/or are considered safety improvements rather than capacity improvements; and are therefore not eligible for impact fee offsets. Said improvements may be coordinated and phased through a separate agreement between the City, the owner/developer of the subject site and the owner/developer of any adjacent site.
3. The owner/developer shall design and construct a two lane paved and striped 35-foot roadway cross section as approved by the Tucson Department of Transportation within a 90 foot public right-of-way to be created by the City of Tucson from Craycroft Road to the rezoning site. The above mentioned improvements are eligible for impact fee offsets.

4. The owner/developer shall dedicate a new 90-foot public road right-of-way through the rezoning site from east to west.
5. The preliminary development plan shall be redesigned to show the new 90-foot public roadway through the rezoning site. This new public roadway shall connect to a new public road through the Los Reales landfill connecting to Craycroft Road on the west, and a new public roadway through the property to the east connecting to Wilmot Road on the east.
6. The owner/developer shall design and construct the new 90-foot public roadway through the rezoning site from the west property line of the rezoning site to Wilmot Road per the *Major Streets and Routes Plan* 90-foot cross section. A proportionate share of the above mentioned improvements will be eligible for impact fee offsets. Said proportionate share shall be for those improvements that add additional roadway/vehicular capacity, above and beyond what is needed for the development, and shall exclude site specific/fronting improvements (such as fronting curbs and sidewalks).
7. The owner/developer shall submit a revised Traffic Impact Analysis providing acceptable recommended improvements to address the proposed future traffic impacts along all right-of-way.
8. The owner/developer shall coordinate with ADOT improvements along Wilmot Road and Interstate-10.
9. The owner/developer agrees that upon expiration of the existing lease in April 2009 the developer will not maintain any billboard use on the development site. Until it is removed, the billboard shall be located on a parcel of no less than two acres. No other uses shall be permitted, including motor vehicle parking, and no Certificates of Occupancy shall be issued on the parcel containing the billboard prior to verification by the City of Tucson that the billboard has been removed. If developed prior to April 30, 2009, temporary fencing shall be installed around the perimeter of the two-acre site to prevent vehicular access.
10. The owner/developer shall prepare a complete Drainage Report, including details of detention/retention as follows:
 - a. Each detention/retention basin shall include a sediment trap, or other sediment control measures as approved by the City Engineer, to prevent sedimentation of the detention/retention basin. Each sediment trap, or other sediment control measure, shall have a provision for total drainage.
 - b. Detention/retention basin floors shall be graded to drain either toward the outlet structure or other logical point. Basin floors shall not be flat.

- c. Rectangular basin shapes shall be avoided unless necessitated by recreational or visual amenities within the basin.
 - d. Vegetation shall be used as screening and/or security barrier for a minimum of ten percent of the basin perimeter.
 - e. Detention/retention basins shall be located adjacent to a street or accessible common area. Basin sideslopes in the adjacent area(s) shall be designed and constructed in accordance with the requirements of the Detention/Retention Manual for human activity zones.
 - f. The 100-year regulatory floodplain of Old Rodeo Wash shall remain undisturbed.
 - g. All security barriers and screening for detention/retention basins shall meet Safe By Design guidelines as determined by the Tucson Police Department.
11. The owner/developer shall construct a natural trail along the northern edge of the floodplain of the Old Rodeo Wash. The exact location and construction specifications of the trail will be determined in consultation with and as agreed to by the City of Tucson Parks and Recreation Department and the Transportation Department.
 12. The owner/developer shall construct temporary fencing north of the 100-year regulatory floodplain of Old Rodeo Wash during site construction. Fencing shall be removed at the completion of construction.
 13. Rainwater harvesting from building roofs and parking lots shall be employed to support landscaped areas and shall include parking lot tree wells, landscape buffers, and depressed planting basins along the pedestrian trail.
 14. Invasive plants that are not native to the Sonoran desert shall not be used for site landscaping, including fountain grass and South American mesquite species. Native plants indigenous to the site and other species common to the Arizona Upland, such as velvet mesquite, blue palo verde, foothills palo verde, desert willow and various shrubs, should be used in site landscaping to the extent practicable.
 15. Discharge of stormwater runoff from the developed portion of the site to Old Rodeo Wash shall be engineered to abate the velocity of water movement in order to prevent damage to the soils in the tobosa swale habitat of the wash. Designs of water energy dissipating structures shall be provided with construction plans for the site and shall be designed to recreate pre-site stormwater discharge velocities within the wash.

16. Child and adult day care facilities shall not be located adjacent to landfill uses or activities.
17. Integrated architecture and landscape architecture themes and treatments shall be employed throughout the site.
18. Comparable architectural elements and colors shall be incorporated on all sides of the buildings, including front, side, and back. Elevations shall be submitted at time of development plan review.
19. Rooflines shall be varied, and mechanical rooftop equipment shall be screened from view.
20. Separate commercial pads within the shopping center shall be integrated into the design of the overall development.
21. Outdoor storage areas shall be screened and designed to be less visible to customers and visitors.
22. Signage internal to the site and along Craycroft or Wilmot, shall be designed to be clearly visible, promote ease of use of the development, aesthetically appealing, and integrated into the surrounding landscaping plan so that the message is clear, but not a dominant feature.
23. Building entryway features shall be designed to be clearly defined and highly visible.
24. A minimum of four pedestrian amenity areas that include outdoor seating shall be provided.
25. Trees that are a minimum size of 15 gallons shall be placed so as to provide a pleasant micro-climate for pedestrians.
26. All walls visible from a public right-of-way and/or adjacent to existing residential development, are to be graffiti-resistant and incorporate one (1) or more visually appealing design treatments, such as the use of two (2) or more decorative materials like stucco, tile, stone, or brick; a visually interesting design on the wall surface; varied wall alignments, (jog, curve, notch, setback, etc.); and/or trees and shrubs in voids created by the wall variations.
27. Where applicable six (6) inch wide fence block or greater shall be used for perimeter walls.

28. An archaeological assessment and survey shall be performed by a qualified archaeologist before any grading or other ground modification takes place. If cultural features or remains are found, testing and data recovery shall be completed as needed. Copies of testing plans, testing reports, data recovery plans and final reports shall be submitted to and approved by the City Historic Preservation Office prior to construction work commencing. If, during construction, human remains and/or associated burial items are discovered, ground disturbing activities in the vicinity of the discovery will cease, the discovery site will be secured, and the Arizona State Museum will be immediately notified as required under A. R. S. 41-865.
29. “Safe by Design” concepts shall be incorporated in the development plan for review by the Tucson Police Department.
30. Any relocation, modification, etc., of existing utilities and/or public improvements necessitated by the proposed development shall be at no expense to the public.
31. Five years are allowed from the date of initial authorization to implement and effectuate all Code requirements and conditions of rezoning.

Zero (0) written approvals and zero (0) written protests were received prior to the Zoning Examiner’s public hearing on November 30, 2006.

A simple majority vote will be necessary to adopt an ordinance rezoning the subject property once the conditions of rezoning are met.
